IETF/Internet Society History

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Pre-IETF

- 1958: Advanced Research Projects Agency (ARPA) formed in reaction to Sputnik
- 1960s: ARPA and others explored concepts of packet switched data networks
- 1968: ARPANET RFP
- 1969: ARPANET first nodes
- 1969: RFC series started to record notes about ARPANET related work Jon Postel became RFC Editor (& IANA)
- 1974: ITCP proposed (Cerf and Kahn) evolved into TCP/IP

Pre-IETF, contd.

- 1979: "Internet Configuration Control Board" (ICCB) established by Vint Cerf (ARPANET program manager) to oversee development of Internet technology standards
- 1983: ICCB Renamed "Internet Activities Board" (IAB) Reorganized around Task Forces

Internet Engineering Task Force (IETF)

Internet Research Task Force (IRTF)

Same year that ARPANET switched to TCP/IP

- IAB was standards approval body for IETF

 1992: IAB renamed Internet Architecture Board
- IETF & IRTF funding (as needed) from US government U.S. government funding ended in 1997

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Internet Society Emerging

- October 26, 1989: discussion of IETF liability
- Late 1989-early 1991: Vint Cerf & Bob Kahn started talking about forming the Internet Society

Vint & Bob were at the Corporation for National Research Initiatives (CNRI)

CNRI was serving as the IETF's secretariat

- August 30, 1991: ISOC announced
- November 18, 1991: Vint presented ISOC plans at IETF
- June 15, 1992: First Board meeting in Kobe, Japan
- Dec 11, 1992: ISOC incorporated
 as a 501(c)3 tax-exempt charitable organization in
 Washington, DC, USA

ISOC Purposes

• Original Purposes:

To facilitate and support the technical evolution of the Internet ...

To educate the academic and scientific communities and the public concerning the Internet

To promote scientific and educational applications of Internet technology for the benefit of educational institutions

To provide a forum for exploration of new Internet applications and to foster collaboration in use of the Internet

ISOC

Individual membership organization
 Originally direct trustee elections

Except for 3 Charter Members (TERENA, EDUCAUSE & CNRI)
Had permanent Board seats and veto power over by-laws changes
Charter members relinquished veto power and permanent
Board membership in 1969

- Funding through memberships, INET revenues
- Provided some support for IETF in early 1990s

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IETF

- 1992: IETF reorganized (RFC 1396)
 Precipitated by "Kobe" IAB overreach
 IESG became standards approval body
 IAB: architectural advice and external relationships
- 1996: IETF accepted ISOC's legal housing offer with RFCs 2026 and RFC 2031

ISOC purchased insurance for IETF decision makers

 IETF was (and is) described as an "organized activity of the Internet Society"

IETF has no independent legal standing

IETF & ISOC

- 1998: ISOC contracted for RFC Editor
- 2005: IETF agreed that ISOC was the IETF financial home with RFC 4071 (a.k.a. BCP 101)

All IETF funding handled by ISOC under direction of the IETF Administrative Oversight Committee (IAOC) ISOC committed to providing support for IETF

IETF funding from IETF meeting fees, sponsorships & ISOC \$6 million annual budget (ISOC contribution \$2 M)

 December 15, 2005: IETF Trust formed by ISOC & CNRI

To hold IETF-related IPR

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IETF Today

- 126 working groups in 9 areas
- · Areas managed by area directors
- IETF Chair is area director for the General Area
- Area directors, sitting as a body, comprise the Internet Engineering Steering Group (IESG)
 Review and approve publication of IETF documents
 Standards, and other documents, published as "RFCs"
- Internet Architecture Board (IAB)
- Face-to-face meetings 3 times per year 1,100 to 1,500 people on-site

ISOC Evolution

- 2002: Public Interest Registry formed Becomes the major ISOC funding source
- 2003: Board selection revised: IETF(3), chapters(3), organizational members(6) Individuals if quantity threshold reached
- 2013: Board selection revised: IETF(4), chapters(4), organizational members (4)
